



Many of us like to share our travelling experiences with friends and family through holiday photos and videos, but for one Hurst Green resident, this hobby has seen him produce semi-professional travelogue films for local organisations to enjoy!

Over the past 20 years, Ray Young has travelled far and wide, taking in China, Hong-Kong, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Tunisia, South Africa, Egypt, Kenya, France, USA, Peru, Argentina, Brazil, Tanzania, Costa Rica and others. For the last three years, Ray has been taking his Travelogues to local group meetings including those for Senior Citizens, Friendship, Womens Institutes, History, Church and others, for members to listen to and watch, and gain an insight into different cultures, cuisine, wildlife and flora of countries that many people may never have the chance to visit or experience.

Ray explains how it all started: 'By good fortune, my work in the music recording industry sent me to various parts of the world and I always took my video camera with me. I had a good grounding in camera operating ever since my Dad bought an 8mm movie camera in 1956. I fell in love with it and realised its potential for creativity. I later acquired a digital video camera and spent weeks editing the pictures,

adding music, sound effects and informative voice-overs, and I get immense satisfaction from people's reaction to the results. Each Travelogue show lasts about 60-75 minutes, including films of 30 minutes each. To show where we are in the world, I take very large scale maps showing the flights and continents being visited. I also take local artifacts, such as hand crafted animal models, huge Ostrich eggs and native articles.

I provide all the equipment necessary for each show. A 40 inch TV & DVD Player for groups up to 20, or a DVD projector, screen and loudspeakers for larger groups. No charge is made for the shows or travelling but as an authorised collector for The Kent Surrey Sussex Air Ambulance Fund, I do ask for a voluntary donation that goes entirely to this life saving Charity.

I am happy to say, through the generosity of all concerned, in the past three years, I have been able to send over £1,100 to the Air Fund. I am told It costs £180 every fill up, and £1600 every lift off, for each of the 2000 incidents they rush to attend'.
